It is not too late to enjoy another nearly 4 months of the growing season. Just think, the first average frost isn't until around Sept. 20. You can still plant seeds and enjoy a long season of harvest of bloom or vegetables.

## Remember to acidify...

### Azaleas, Rhododendrons, Blueberry & (maybe) Hydrangea

If you are growing any of these plants and like to have blue blossoms on your Endless Summer Hydrangeas, remember to use soil acidifier every 60 days during every growing season. That mean that if you applied soil acidifier to your established plants at the beginning of the growing season, now's the time to reapply. For the first three species, those plants need acidic soil conditions to garner enough nutrients from the soil simply to survive, let alone bloom and bear fruit. For the Endless Summer Hydrangea, the blossoms will begin to fade to purple and then pink without the acidifier.
